

The single-family house at 407 Ashland Avenue is set on a small lot, located on the east side of the street between West Ferry Avenue and Breckenridge Street. Ashland Avenue is a prominent, north-south, residential street that runs the length of the West Side. The property is located in an upscale residential area of the south eastern section of the Grant-Ferry-Forest neighborhood.

A two story, hipped roof, modest, urban residence with foursquare influenced design and mixed Queen Anne styling. It has a square plan and it set on a stone foundation. The façade has a half-width, hipped roof, open porch in the north bay with ¾ height Roman Tuscan columns on square piers, turned spindle open rail, flat frieze, and centered entry stair. The main entrance is located in the north bay of the façade centered under the porch. The second floor façade has a projecting polygonal oriel in the south bay supported by small brackets. Exterior wall fabrics are clapboard. Fenestration is one-over-one double-hung wood sash with extensive leaded glass panes. A hipped dormer with distinguished triple window grouping accents the front roof slope; double hipped roof dormers on north and south roof slope. Brick chimney at central roof ridge. Additional architectural details include lookout rafters, corner pilasters, and extensive frieze and cornice trim.

The building at 407 Ashland Avenue is significant as a good representative example of a two-story, hipped roof, urban residence with foursquare influenced design and mixed Queen Anne styling. Such modestly styled single-family dwellings were typical of middle class, urban living in the early twentieth century on the West Side of Buffalo. Built for George D. Dow. A Contributing building to the Richmond Avenue – Ashland Avenue Historic District.



The single-family house at 409 Ashland Avenue is set on a small lot, located on the east side of the street between Ferry Avenue and Breckenridge Street. Ashland Avenue is a prominent, north-south, residential street that runs the length of the West Side. The property is located in an upscale residential area of the south eastern section of the Grant-Ferry-Forest neighborhood.

A two-and-one–half story, mixed and modestly Shingle style influenced residence with steeply pitched, gambrel and cross-gabled roof. It has an irregular plan and visible stone foundation. The façade has a half-width, semicircular wraparound, flat roof, open porch in the south bay with square column supports, turned spindle open wood rail, and frieze. The main entrance is located in a cutout in the extreme south bay of the façade under the porch. Exterior wall fabrics are wood clapboard. Fenestration is one-over-one double-hung wood sash, casement, and fixed; reserved wood framing and leaded glass. Front gambrel punctuated by Palladian window. Brick chimney off ridge at southern edge of gambreled slope.

The dwelling as a whole is of a vein typical of middle class, urban living in the early twentieth century in the Grant-Ferry-Forest neighborhood of Buffalo, though Queen Anne residences are most prominent. A Contributing building to the Richmond Avenue – Ashland Avenue Historic District.

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

The property is located in an upscale residential area of the south eastern section of the Grant-Ferry-Forest neighborhood.

NON-CONTRIBUTING

A two-and-one -half story, side gabled residence of what was likely, modest mixed period styling.

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The building at 410 Ashland Avenue is significant as a **non-contributing** building of the Richmond Avenue – Ashland Avenue Historic District. The residence retains its initial styling and character, despite the changes in exterior fabrics of altered asbestos shingling.

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
The single-family house at 411 Ashland Avenue is set on a shortened lot, located on the east side of the street between West Ferry Avenue and Breckenridge Street. Ashland Avenue is a prominent, north-south, residential street that runs the length of the West Side. The property is located in an upscale residential area of the south eastern section of the Grant-Ferry-Forest neighborhood.

A two-and-one –half story, cross gabled Queen Anne styled residence. It has a rough rectangular plan and visible stone foundation. The façade has a full-width, hipped roof porch. Enclosed living area in south bay, open area in north bay with square trimmed columns, open spindle rail, and pediment with decorative scrolling. The main entrance is located in the center of the façade under the porch. The second floor façade has a projecting polygonal oriel in the south bay. Two-story, projecting bay and covered secondary entrance visible on the south elevation. Exterior wall fabrics are wood clapboard on the main block with wood shingle in the gable ends. Fenestration is one-over-one double-hung wood sash and fixed with leaded glass panes. Front gable punctuated by triple window grouping and decorative shingling. Brick chimney in roof valley to the south front. Additional architectural details include visible rafter tails and wood frieze.

A small garage occupies the rear south corner of the lot.

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
The two-family house at 412 Ashland Avenue is set on a medium-sized lot, located on the west side of the street between West Ferry Avenue and Breckenridge Street. Ashland Avenue is a prominent, north-south, residential street that runs the length of the West Side. The property is located in an upscale residential area of the south eastern section of the Grant-Ferry-Forest neighborhood.

A two-and-one-half story, cross gabled, modest, urban Queen Anne residence. It has a roughly rectangular plan and it set on a stone foundation. The façade has a full-width porch with ³/₄ square column supports set on solid brick rail intersperse by a section of open wood rail. The main entrance is located in the south bay of the façade. The second floor façade has an open porch with modern metal rail supports and awning; projecting polygonal bay with French doors in the north. Exterior wall fabrics are clapboard on the main block and standard and fish scale wood shingle in the gable end. Fenestration is one-over-one double-hung wood sash, fixed, and hopper. A Palladian window punctuates the front gable peak. A brick chimney rests in the north rear roof valley.

A garage occupies the south rear corner of the lot.

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
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The single-family house at 415 Ashland Avenue is set on a shortened lot, located on the east side of the street between West Ferry Avenue and Breckenridge Street. Ashland Avenue is a prominent, north-south, residential street that runs the length of the West Side. The property is located in an upscale residential area of the south eastern section of the Grant-Ferry-Forest neighborhood.

A two-and-one-half story, cross gabled Queen Anne styled residence. It has a roughly rectangular plan and it set on a stone foundation. The façade has a half-width porch in the north bay with square column supports, turned spindle open wood rail, and shed roof line dominated by a large pediment with decorative scrollwork. The main entrance is located in the north bay of the façade under the porch. The second floor façade has a central oriel with embellished timbering and cut-away corners. Exterior wall fabrics are clapboard with fish scale wood shingle in the front gable end. Fenestration is one-over-one double-hung wood sash and hopper. The front gable is punctuated by a paired window grouping and projecting peak with decorative scrollwork complimenting that on the porch pediment. A brick chimney rests in the south rear valley.
